
#### Dear friends,

We are happy to report that in 2023 PeaceWorks was able to send down \$145,000 to our Nicaraguan partners - the third largest amount in our history! With your help, we were able to support rural farmers and women fleeing domestic violence. We helped Nicaraguan organiations educate and feed children working on the streets of Managua, protect endangered sea turtles, provide services to children with disabilities, fix houses and so much more.

This outpouring of solidarity is especially heartwarming for a couple of reasons. First, our Nicaraguan partners are facing increasing hardships and need our support more than ever before. And second, this year marks the 10th anniversary of the passing of Peace-Works founder, Jim Burchell.

#### Jim Burchell, 1954-2014

In the 20 plus years Jim spent developing PeaceWorks, he built a broad network of mutual support by taking delegations from the New Jersey area to Nicaragua, and bringing Nicaraguan partners up to meet with groups and individuals in this region. He maintained constant communication with the growing PeaceWorks community, well before there was such a thing as social media, by writing newsletters and organizing dinner forums, aid shipments, speaking engagements and fundraisers. He wove together a true people-to-people network of solidarity, one that we're happy to say continues to this day.



Ten years after his passing, Jim's work with the people of Nicaragua continues to bear fruit.

No matter where we go, Jim Burchell continues to be loved by so many in Nicaragua. While we admit that this is a hard act to follow, we are carrying his legacy forward.

Our ambassador-at-large Diane Sterner, is in constant contact with our Nicaraguan partners, keeping lines of communication open and organizing delegations




Jim on location in Managua, circa 2004


